Information about school reopening in January (Post 16 students)

Dear parents, carers and students,

I hope you have had a safe, restful and enjoyable break. You will be aware the Government yesterday announced a further change to school reopening plans.

From **Monday 4th January**, we have been instructed to only open school to students in years 7 – 11 who are:

- Vulnerable children
- Children of critical workers

During the week of **4th January**, school will also be inviting in Post 16 students who have exams during this week for a revision session and their exam. **Students attending for revision or exams should arrive in normal uniform, including their own suitable face mask, and use their usual entrance.**

Please note that there are other Post 16 exams scheduled to take place in Functional Skills – Mathematics, Finance, Health and Social Care, Law and Science during the first few weeks of January. These exams are still taking place and students must continue their revision at home. Information regarding face to face revision sessions will follow next week.

During the week commencing **Monday 4th January**, Post 16 remote learning will start for year 12 and 13 students. It is imperative that Post 16 students check their SCHOOL email account on a regular basis to ensure they access remote learning.

From **Monday 11th January**, we have been asked to only open school and provide on-site education to vulnerable children, children of critical workers and those in specific exam years, and provide remote education to all other students. **This means we will be opening fully to all year 13 students from Monday 11th January**, as well as for selected other students with exams in coming weeks. Year 12 students should stay at home and school will continue to support your child through remote learning.

From **Monday 18th January** all students in year 12 and 13, as well as other year groups, should return to on-site education.

Over the next two weeks, school staff will be working hard to establish procedures for the mass testing for COVID in school for staff and students. The logistics of setting this up, getting access to the tests and training staff will take us some time and we hope by the time school fully reopens we will have finalised putting plans in place. Once this important planning has taken place, we will contact you with further information and to gather your consent for your child to take part.

Once again thank you for your understanding. I wish you a Happy New Year and we look forward to welcoming all our students back in to school by 18th January.

Definitions of 'vulnerable children' (taken from <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/schools-and-childcare-settings-return-in-january-2021/schools-and-childcare-settings-return-in-january-2021>)

Vulnerable children and young people include those who:

- are assessed as being in need under section 17 of the Children Act 1989, including children and young people who have a child in need plan, a child protection plan or who are a looked-after child
- have an education, health and care (EHC) plan
- have been identified as otherwise vulnerable by educational providers or local authorities (including children's social care services), and who could therefore benefit from continued full-time attendance, this might include:
 - children and young people on the edge of receiving support from children's social care services or in the process of being referred to children's services
 - adopted children or children on a special guardianship order
 - those at risk of becoming NEET ('not in employment, education or training')
 - those living in temporary accommodation
 - those who are young carers
 - those who may have difficulty engaging with remote education at home (for example, due to a lack of devices or quiet space to study)
 - care leavers
 - other children and young people at the provider and local authority's discretion including pupils who need to attend to receive support or manage risks to their mental health

Definitions of 'critical workers' (taken from <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-maintaining-educational-provision/guidance-for-schools-colleges-and-local-authorities-on-maintaining-educational-provision>)

- **Health and Social care:** This includes, but is not limited to, doctors, nurses, midwives, paramedics, social workers, care workers, and other frontline health and social care staff including volunteers; the support and specialist staff required to maintain the UK's health and social care sector; those working as part of the health and social care supply chain, including producers and distributors of medicines and medical and personal protective equipment.
- **Education and Childcare:** This includes childcare, support and teaching staff, social workers, specialist education professionals who must remain active during the coronavirus (COVID-19) response to deliver this approach.
- **Key public services:** This includes those essential to the running of the justice system, religious staff, charities and workers delivering key frontline services, those responsible for the management of the deceased, journalists and broadcasters who are providing public service broadcasting.
- **Local and national government:** This only includes those administrative occupations essential to the effective delivery of the coronavirus (COVID-19) response or delivering essential public services, such as the payment of benefits, including in government agencies and arms length bodies.
- **Food and other necessary goods:** This includes those involved in food production, processing, distribution, sale and delivery as well as those essential to the provision of other key goods (for example hygienic and veterinary medicines).
- **Public safety and national security:** This includes police and support staff, Ministry of Defence civilians, contractor and armed forces personnel (those critical to the delivery of key defence and national security outputs and essential to the response to the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak), fire and rescue service employees (including support staff), National Crime Agency staff, those maintaining border security, prison and probation staff and other national security roles, including those overseas.
- **Transport:** This includes those who will keep the air, water, road and rail passenger and freight transport modes operating during the coronavirus (COVID-19) response, including those working on transport systems through which supply chains pass.
- **Utilities, communication and financial services:** This includes staff needed for essential financial services provision (including but not limited to workers in banks, building societies and financial market infrastructure), the oil, gas, electricity and water sectors (including sewerage), information technology and data infrastructure sector and primary industry supplies to continue during the coronavirus (COVID-19) response, key staff working in the civil nuclear, chemicals, telecommunications (including but not limited to network operations, field engineering, call centre staff, IT and data infrastructure, 999 and 111 critical services), postal services and delivery, payments providers, waste disposal sectors.
